## Getting Government Right: Rights-Based Approaches, Government Integrity and Anti-Corruption

Through a series of lectures, group exercises, site visits and discussions, this learning programme critically interlinks the practical application of human rights, good governance, democracy and development. Participants appreciate the structural sources of corruption, the elements of good governance and identify rights-based approaches required to fight corruption and bad governance. Participants are also guided in drafting action plans within the priorities of their organisations' activities thus linking learning to the work place. Site visits are organized to institutions such as the Public Procurement and Disposal of Public Assets Authority (PPDA), the Office of the Inspector General of Government (IGG) and the Anti-Corruption Division of the High Court – all in Uganda.

### Target Group Description

The target group is senior managers in the public sector, NGOs and civil society organizations primarily in Denmark's priority countries. The participants are expected to be counterparts to Danida supported development activities.

### Learning Objectives

The learning objective of the learning programme is to provide participants with an understanding of rights-based approaches, the elements of good governance, and interventions required to fight corruption and bad governance.

By the end of the learning programme, participants will be able to:

- Account for key concepts and principles relating to the role of governments acting with integrity;
- Appreciate the interlinkages between human rights, good governance and development;
- Identify the principles of the human rights-based approach;
- Apply rights-based approaches in programming and through service delivery and advocacy;
- Promote partnerships between CSOs and local governments in the fight against corruption in service delivery and in the application of the human rights based approach;
- Select appropriate development tools used to measure corruption;
- Determine the effectiveness of anti-corruption schemes for design of an effective anti-corruption programme and integrity system; and
- Compare national, regional and international efforts to eradicate corruption.



### Modules

The learning programme will cover a number of themes and topics including:



- A Conceptual and Legal Framework for Governance and Human Rights, including: definitions, institutions mandated to fight corruption;
- Good Governance, Human Rights and Development;
- Key Principles of the Human Rights-based Approach to Development;
- Application of the Human Rights-Based Approach in the Project Cycle;
- HRBA Thematic Focus on Special Interest Group;
- Taxonomy and Causes of Corruption;
- Corruption in the Public Sector, including in the area of public procurement;
- Effects of Corruption;
- Tools to Fight and Measure Corruption;
- Case Study: National, Regional and International Interventions to combat Corruption.

## Pre- Assessment

Participants will be asked to fill out a pre-training questionnaire which will be used to assess their profile, past training in related learning programmes and as well tailor make the curriculum according to their training needs.

## Certification

Upon completion of the learning programme, participants will be issued two certificates, one from the International Law Institute - African Center for Legal Excellence (ILI-ACLE) and the other from the Danish Ministry of Foreign Affairs.

## Application Procedure

Application procedures must follow the procedures stipulated in "Guidelines for Danida Fellowships". The guidelines are available at your local Danish Embassy or can be downloaded at DFC's website; [www.dfcentre.com](http://www.dfcentre.com).

The application form is electronic and the link to the application form will be sent to the Danish Embassies in Danida priority countries together with this leaflet to ensure only people who are affiliated with Danida funded programmes/projects/NGOs apply for the learning programme. You have to contact your local Danish Embassy or your Danida Programme/Project to get the link for the application form. The application is filled in online and your Danida programme/project/NGO is to endorse the application by filling in the Programme/project Endorsement page which is available at the online application step 4. The application will after the deadline be forwarded to the Danish Embassy for their endorsement. The selection of participants will be carried out by DFC and the management team based on incoming applications.

**Deadline for submitting the application form in the online application system or to the Danish Embassy is May 1, 2017**

### Fee:

The Learning programme is co-funded by Danida Capacity Development Support Programme. After selection of participants, the Danida programmes/projects/NGOs are charged a non-refundable amount of DKK 5,000 per participant per tutorial week. Total funding needs are DKK 10,000 per participant (approx. 1.500 USD). This covers study fees, accommodation, allowances, and for non-Ugandan participants; insurances and international transport. The fee is to be covered by the Danish Embassy or by the Danida programme with which the applicants are affiliated with.
